Have Faith in Your Intelligence.

• Use your notes, the novel, the questions I gave you, and your prior experience writing an essay. Focus, do not distract others, and you will do well.

Do Not Panic.

 Anyone who has done nothing more than to sit in class and listen knows at least some of the material.

Budget Your Time.

 Keep an eye on the clock. Do not spend all 50 minutes writing your introduction. Divide your time among paragraphs and go back and add sentences in when you finish.

Answer the Major Question.

• Your essay should have a thesis statement, which is a statement that clearly states the main idea of your writing and outlines your most salient (important) points.

Use a General Organizing Principle.

Block Format, Point to Point, etc. Pick a format and stick to it. Do not forget an
introduction and conclusion.

Proofread.

• If you finish early, proofread the test to check facts, spelling, punctuation, and grammar.
